## Tips for Funding College Education Without the Big Student Loans

Keep in mind, there are 2 different financial aids to help you out in seeking those funds:

Merit-Based Aid: Merit-based financial aid is what many people refer to as scholarships awarded to a student by either an individual college or outside organization without regard for financial need. Students typically receive merit-based scholarships for academic achievements though some can be awarded for special talents leadership skills or other personal characteristics; athletic scholarships also fall under this category. This is the financial aid student has to focus on, how to maximize the opportunity of making free money using their skills, achievements and community memberships. At many colleges, every admitted student is automatically considered for the merit scholarships at that school. However, most institutions & organizations require students to complete a separate applications with essays. The advise from students who accumulated a total of 3-digit financial aids, is to create one good essay to cut/paste from it. Another tip, when searching for scholarships using Google or other search engines, search the specific merit you're planning to use such as Art scholarships, health care scholarships, horse-lovers, etc. However, beware of scammers mostly the ones offering free money for doing nothing. Need-Based Aid: Need-based financial aid is awarded to a student on the basis of financial need. The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is generally used for determining federal state and institutional need-based aid eligibility. Before you delve into the world of needbased aid find out first what merit can do for you. However, go ahead and fill-out FAFSA anyway. Who knows, you might get even a small amount.
